A Third Eye poem is written from an unseen perspective. This type of poem details events, moments, or other things that tend to go unseen. This poem can rhyme but it does not have to.

Put It To Use:

Let us write a third eye poem relating to school.



Step 1: Think It Through

Brainstorm several things you may do at school (or have seen others do) when you think no one is watching.

Brainstorms:

Passing notes, talking while the teacher is reading, not doing homework, when another child hit me at recess, when I fell and tried not to cry, when I skipped class, when I got mad because the teacher assigned homework, when I had detention, the wall you walk into at lunch, when I said I was sick to leave the class

Step 2: Write Your Poem

Now write your poem starting every sentence with 'The third eye sees.'

The third eye sees when Johnnie passed that note to Tom.

The third eye sees you talking while the teacher is teaching.

The third eye sees when Lisa hit Amy at recess and said she did not.

The third eye sees the wall you are about to walk into.

The third eye sees you putting that whoopi cushion in Lucy's chair.

The third eye sees when you said you were sick to get out of class.

The third eye sees!
